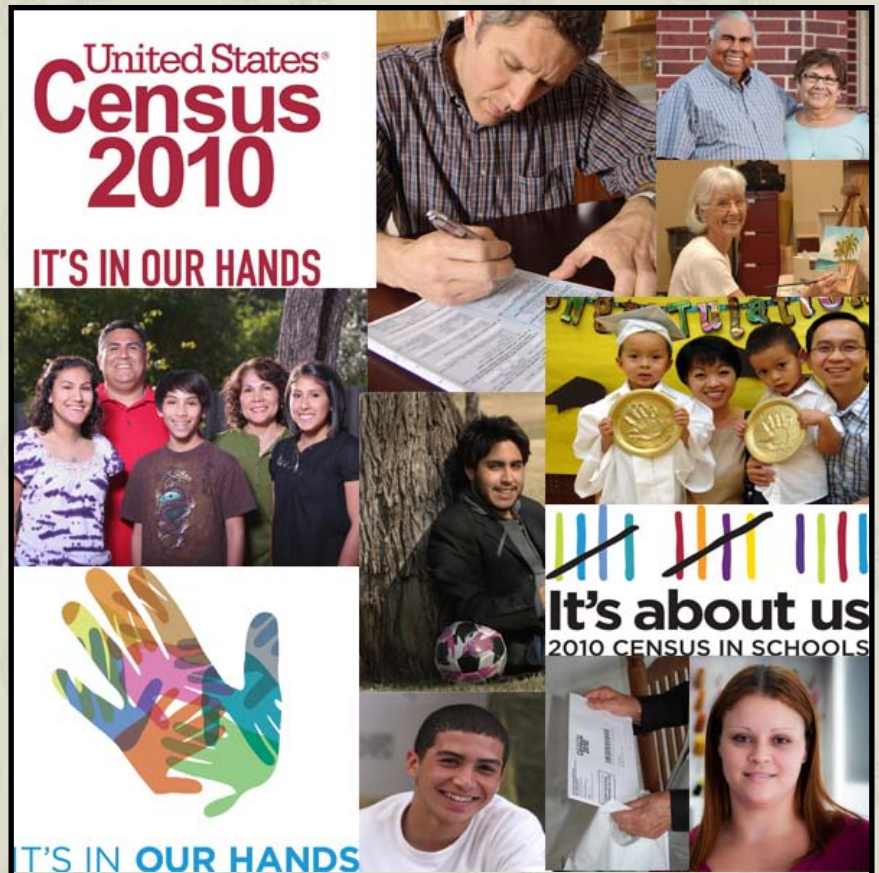

Educate Your Teen

Is your teen driver ready for the open road?



Passing off the keys to your teen driver for the first time can be a scary proposition. You know they're safe, they're ready, they know what they're doing, but what about everyone else? The truth is your teen driver can never be too prepared.

The Dunwoody Police Department now offers the state certified Collision Avoidance Training program (CAT) for teen drivers. This program is an advanced defensive driving and vehicle control program designed for teenage drivers who already possess basic driving skills. This 2-day program is designed to provide young drivers with the knowledge and understanding of vehicle dynamics and human kinetics – the forces created by an automobile and its effects on the human body. A few of the skills student drivers will be required to learn include skid recovery, backing, cornering, evasive maneuvers, and more.

When you fill out the census form, you're making a statement about what resources our community needs going forward.

Accurate data reflecting changes in our community are crucial in apportioning seats in the U.S. House of Representatives and deciding how more than \$400 billion per year is allocated for projects like new hospitals and schools.

That's more than \$4 trillion over a 10-year period for things like new roads and schools, and services like job training centers.

That is why it is so important for you to fill it out and mail it back. Your answers are protected by law and cannot be shared with anyone. The Census safeguards its responses to the highest security standards available.

However, we know you may still have questions or concerns about the census. Dunwoody City Hall will be acting as a Census Assistant Center through the end of April. U.S. Census representative, Barry Garber, will be stationed on the second floor, City administrative offices, three days a week.

Spring into Green

Celebrate a Green Spring with these easy, Eco-Logical Tips

Spring is in the air, and green is popping up all around us. It really IS easy to be green, and here are a few easy eco-tips for getting off to an ecological start for Earth Day.



Lights Out, Power Down – Pull the Plug on those Voracious Energy Vampires. Computers, printers, toasters, hairdryers, blenders, fans, freestanding microwaves, cell chargers and other silent energy vampires keep the wheels on the power meter going round and round. Make it a habit

to pull the plug! Using a power strip for computers and printers and pulling that plug has the added benefit of protection during electrical storms.

Lower Utility Bills - Think PITTI-O! Home buyers and sellers compute principal, interest, taxes and insurance, or PITTI, as the cost of home ownership. The “O” is for Operating Expenses. Fifty percent of home energy costs are heating and cooling, so set thermostats at 78 degrees in the summer and 68 degrees in the winter. Expect a 3% to 5% increase in energy use for every degree you set the thermostat lower in the summer and higher in the winter. Be sure ceiling fans turn counterclockwise in summer months so that rooms seem cooler.

Clean and Green - Two words: Dr. Bronner’s! This company is celebrating 60 years of soap making. Available at Trader Joe’s and Whole Foods, this pure, liquid Castile soap is bio-degradable, approved by the USDA National Organic Program, and is also Certified Fair Trade. Alone or combined with traditional household supplies like vinegar and baking soda, Dr. Bronner’s will clean anything! Two ounces of liquid soap diluted with 8 ounces of water in a spray bottle will keep cleanups in the kitchen, bath, and office simple, toxin free...and affordable.

Mailbox Garden – Here’s an opportunity to plant mint for juleps, basil for pesto and lemon balm for tea. Share with neighbors...you never know what garden goodies they will have to share with you! Visit our Dunwoody Community Garden or check in at Farmer D’s for more ideas, and chat with local farmers at the Dunwoody Green Market.



Take a To Go Cup – Did you know that bottled water costs up to \$10 a gallon? Plastic water bottles are made from non-renewable resources, and it takes about 15 million barrels of oil a year to create enough bottles to meet demand. In honor of Earth Day, get your very own reusable water bottle. Get one for a friend, too!

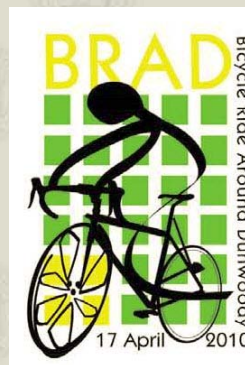
Spring is here again and Dunwoody's Lemonade Days Festival is just around the corner!
