## Old Spring House Lane

### Highlights

- A new crosswalk with a pedestrian refuge island and rectangular rapid flashing beacon was installed on Roberts Drive at Wildcat Park.
- Cherry Hill Road Path construction and associated tree planting were completed, and the path was opened to the public.
- Old Spring House Path construction progressed, with utility relocation, storm drain installation and path construction.
- The Brook Run Park Maintenance Facility project advanced, with contractor mobilization, demolition, site grading and erection of the steel for the first building.
- The Kellogg Springs Drive stream stabilization project was completed.

- Village Crossing public information meeting is scheduled for March 3 from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. at Vintage Pizza.

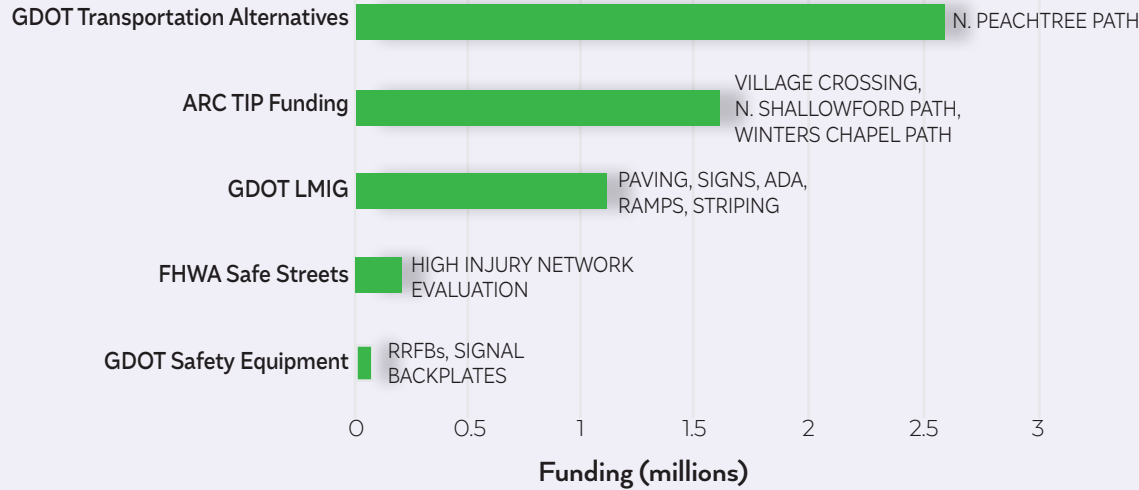
### Accolades, and Happenings

- Pavement resurfacing was completed across the city, with 12.2 miles of roadway repaved on 27 streets.
- Sidewalk ramp upgrades were completed in the Ashford Chase neighborhood to improve accessibility.
- Several infrastructure projects by other agencies were underway during the quarter, GDOT resurfaced Cotillion Drive, and DeKalb County began sanitary sewer installation in the Bend Creek neighborhood, and water main replacement projects on Roberts Drive and Chamblee Dunwoody Road.

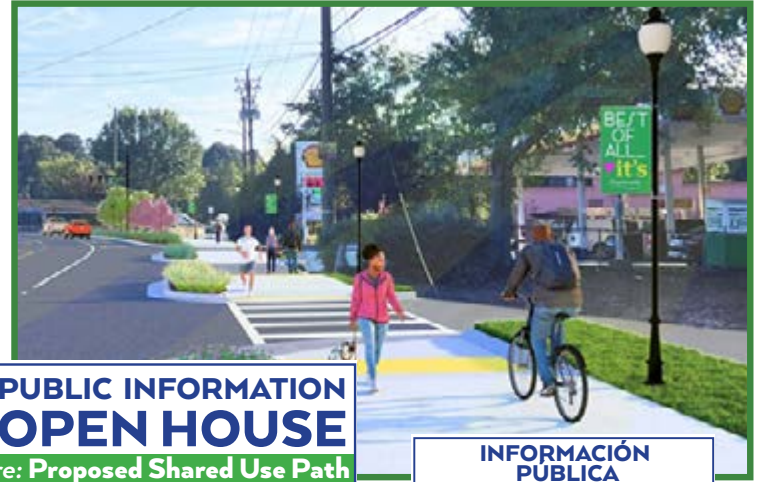

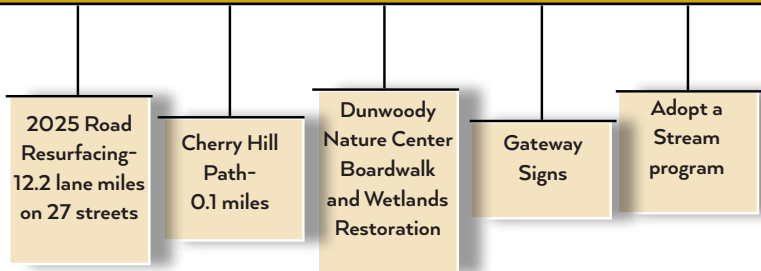

## Highlights

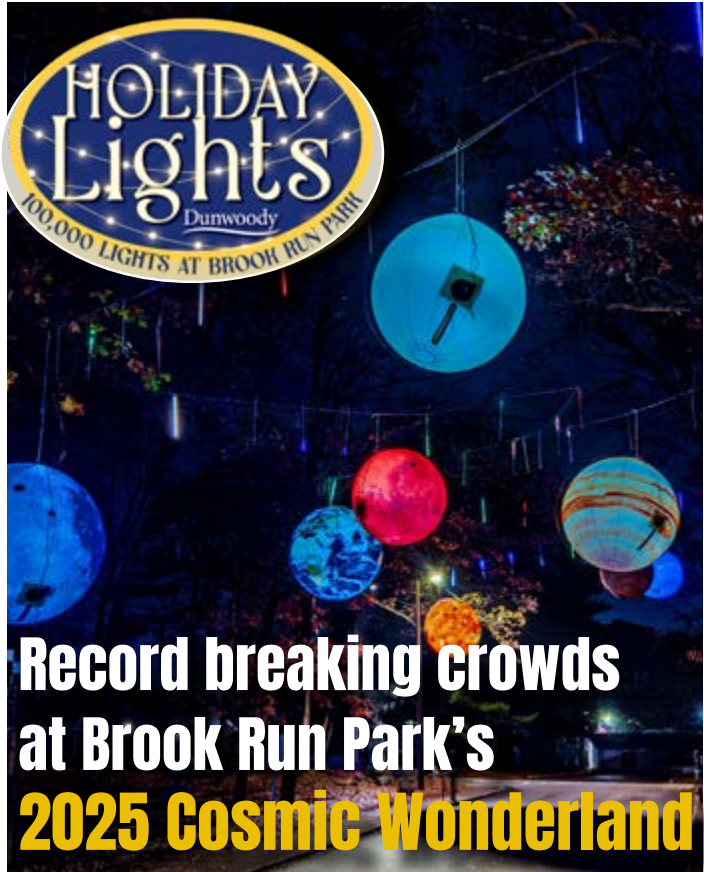
- ADA enhancements at the Spruill Center for the Arts include buttons for a wheelchair lift to be added for improved accessibility in February.

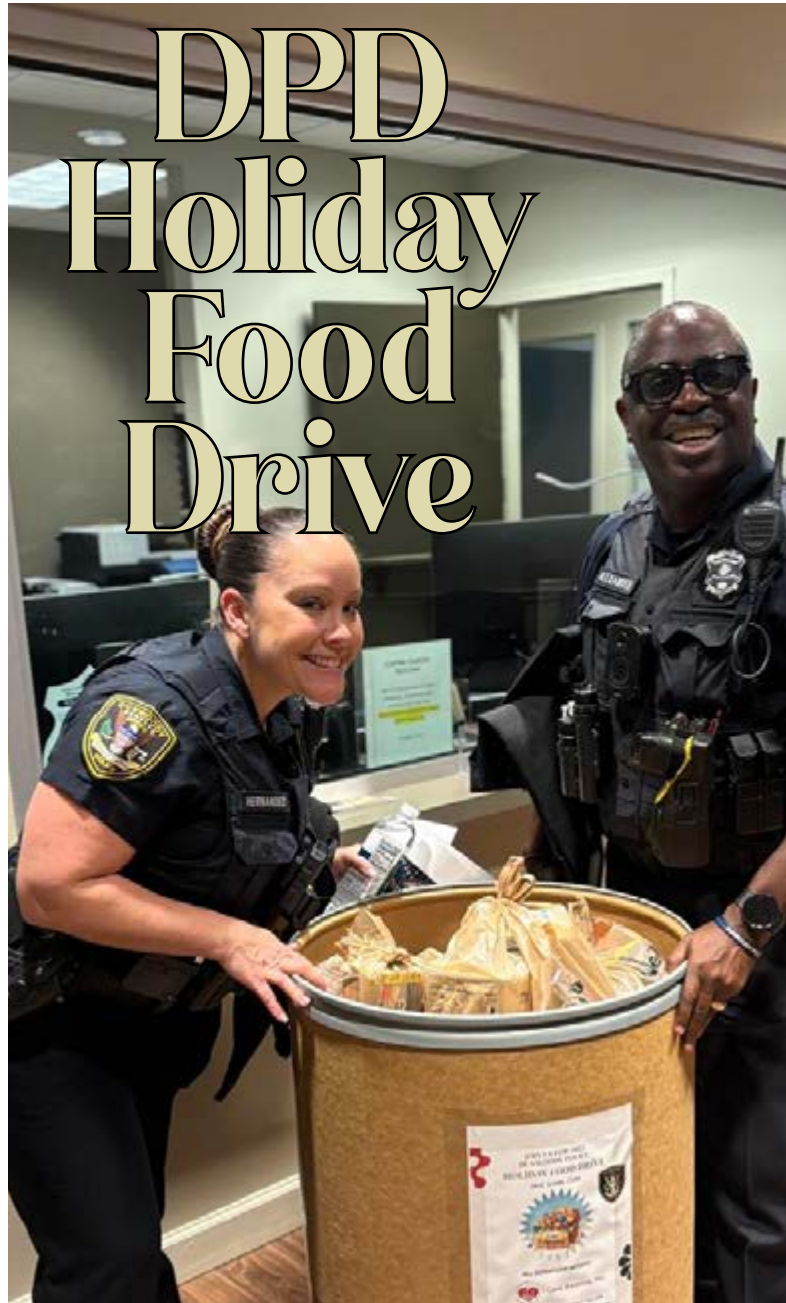

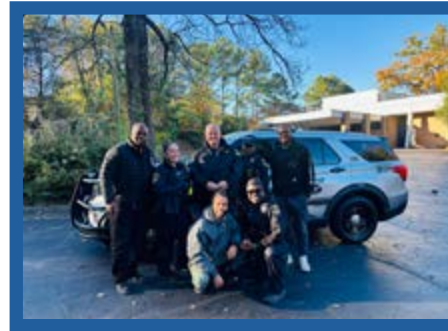

### Highlights

- The city held its annual Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Recycling Event on September 13, 2025, with 504 vehicles participating and 49,266 pounds of material recycled, representing a 57% increase over 2024.

- The department supported homeowners with reduced permit review times for residential solar installations.
- City Council approved rezoning for a veterinary hospital on North Shallowford Road, enabling 24-hour emergency medical services for pets.

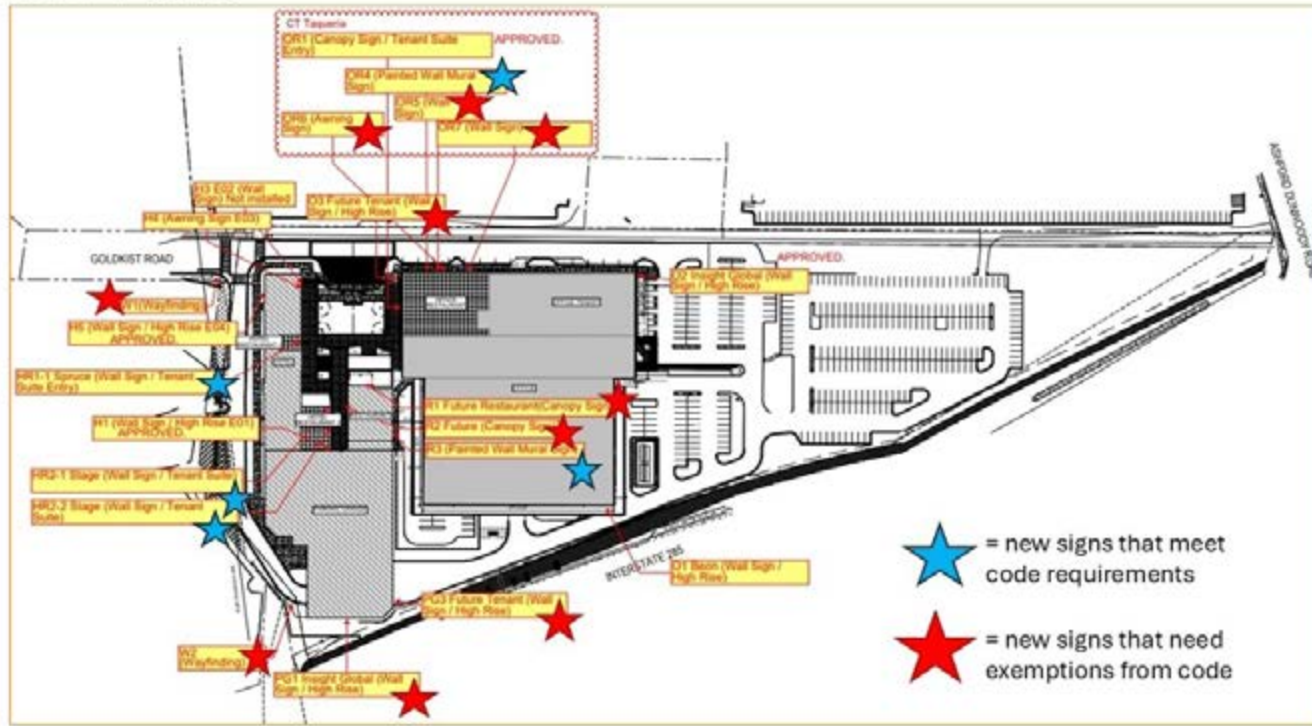
